Government guidance on maintaining educational provision published today

As you know all schools will shut today, Friday 20 March. Exceptions have been announced for children of key workers, vulnerable children with social workers and children with education, health and care (EHC) plans. The government has now published guidance on this. In the guidance it states that schools are being asked to continue to provide care for a limited number of children - children who are vulnerable and children whose parents are critical to the Covid-19 response and cannot be safely cared for at home.

Vulnerable children include children who are supported by social care, those with

safeguarding and welfare needs, including child in need plans, on child protection plans, 'looked after' children, young carers, disabled children and those with EHC plans.

We are aware of widespread concern among families, as many children with EHC plans have medical conditions putting them in the vulnerable group for coronavirus. Others may find changes in the usual school environment, staffing or routine difficult to cope with. Understandably parents do not want to put their children at risk by forcing them to attend school. The guidance says that if it is at all possible for children to be at home, then they should be and if a child needs specialist support, is vulnerable or has a parent who is a critical worker, then educational provision will be available for them.

Coronavirus and welfare benefits

As well as worries about the health loved ones, you may also have concerns about the financial implications for your family, particularly if you or a partner are likely to have to stop working or see a significant drop in earnings. Our family finances adviser <u>answers some of your most common questions about benefits</u> that as a parent with a disabled child you might have.

There have already been a number of changes to the benefits system in response to the current outbreak. It is likely that further changes will be announced in the near future so <u>this webpage</u> will be updated regularly.

What does the emergency Coronavirus bill mean for disabled children?

We've taken a look at the emergency Coronavirus Bill published yesterday (19th March 2020) by the government and made <u>an initial assessment for families with disabled children</u>. The aim of the Bill is to help the government deal with the current coronavirus pandemic. It's not law yet and still needs to pass through Parliament - so there will be a very short opportunity to influence it, which Contact and our partners will try to do.

<u>Our Fledglings online shop</u> is still open - we hope we can meet any demands our families have for goods such as continence products and dishwasher-safe toys.


COVID-19 and families with disabled children – resources to help
