Understanding deafness





The National Deaf Children's Society uses the term 'deaf' to refer to all types of hearing loss from mild to profound.

This includes deafness in one ear or temporary hearing loss such as glue ear.

Understanding deafness





90% of deaf children are born to hearing parents

50% of children are born deaf and 50% will become deaf

8 out of 10 children will experience an episode of glue ear before they are 10



23 - 40% of deaf children have an additional health, learning, or social need.



Implications of deafness for learning



- language and communication
- auditory memory
- processing time
- incidental learning
- self-esteem

How do deaf children communicate at school?





 9% of severely / profoundly deaf children use British sign language

 14% have English or Welsh as an additional spoken language



Teachers of the Deaf (QToD)



- Teachers with an additional postgraduate qualification in deafness.

Barriers for deaf children



Raising a Deaf Child: Family programme



Photo: We have developed short online presentations to help parents navigate some of the common challenges that come with raising a deaf child.

Raising a deaf child can be challenging. For several years now the National Deaf Children's Society has offered courses to parents, providing them with practical strategies they can use day-to-day whilst parenting a deaf child. There are 20 different modules available, covering a wide range of issues many parents will face. Family Sign Language courses on Zoom

We are now teaching families across the UK on Zoom! Our Zoom courses are available for families of up to six people. This means that extended family members such as grandparents can join remotely.

Course dates are flexible and will be arranged depending on families' and tutors' availability.

To take part, families need access to a device with a stable internet connection, such as a computer or tablet.

We are now welcoming applications for round three of our Family Sign Language Zoom courses. Places are limited. We will prioritise those families:

- with a deaf child aged between 0 and 7 years old
- who experience communication difficulties in the home

Professionals and settings have the knowledge and skills they need about deafness in the early years, with a policy enviornment which enables them to provide support



Professionals and settings, supported by a positive policy enviornment, provide appropriate, tailored support to deaf babies and children in the early years



Deaf babies and children in the early years have a bright start in life through getting the support they need right from the start, and successfully transition into primary school



Deaf children have the same attainment and the same wellbeing as their hearing peers

"I can be independent, have a go, bounce back after difficulty and know it's ok to try again."

"I can communicate my needs and socialise with my friends and family-I want to have fun and to be included!"

"I know who I am, that I feel a sense of belonging and that I connect with my deaf identity."

"I can express myself freely and for my feelings to be understood as well as understanding other people's feelings too."

"Everyone works together with me and for my good. If all the grown ups in my life see possibilities instead of problems, I can be ready for my next step in my journey. Nothing for me without me."

"You have high aspirations for me! I want to learn and for my learning to build and grow."





What do parents tell us?
