Out of Energy Survey results March 2022

How we conducted the survey

- Contact wanted to find out how rising energy costs are affecting families with sick and disabled children
- We ran a self-selecting online survey between 10 21 March 2022
- By definition the survey excludes anyone who doesn't have internet connection and includes only those who choose to take part
- We received a total of 7565 responses. We would like to thank every who took the time to complete the survey.

Methodology

- This analysis is based on 5499 respondents who are parents with one or more disabled children and are responsible for paying their household energy bills.
- Bases for questions can only reflect those that answered some questions were skipped
- Only fully completed survey responses with analyzed
- A breakdown of results by nation and region is available

Key findings

• 85% of families with disabled children use more energy due to their child's condition – special equipment, sometimes life-saving, powered by electricity, more washing due to continence issues, more heating due to mobility issues.

In the last 12 months (April 2021 – March 2022)

- UK households with disabled children had average energy bills of £1909 per year (£159 per month) This is around £600 a year more compared to the average household bill.*
- And their energy bills have increased by £805 per year (£67 per month)
- This winter 42% have gone without any heating due to the costs and of those 63% have had to go without heating daily or once or twice a week.
- And 8% of disabled households had to go without vital disability aids or appliances this winter because they were unaffordable to run.
- On average the extra energy costs for using their necessary disabled aids or appliances is £74 per month. The electricity powered equipment most used by families adjustable beds, ceiling track hoists, feeding pumps, wheelchair chargers, additional fridges for medication.

Reaction to April 2022 increased energy bills

- Households with disabled children are expecting an increase of average annual energy bills of £1112 (£92 per month) from April. Taking average energy bills to more than £3000 a year (£250 per month).
- Clearly all respondents are worried about these energy bill increases 67% are extremely worried; 26% very worried and 7% a little worried


As a result:

- 75% of households with sick or disabled children say they will have to regularly turn the heating down and 53% will have to regularly turn the heating off.
- 40% report this increase is likely to make their child's condition worse.
- 35% say they will go without basics like food and clothing to keep heating on or risk child's condition getting worse.
- 29% are worried they will have to borrow money to pay these increased energy bills

*Source Ofgem 2021. The average UK energy bill is £1,277 per year across all UK homes for gas and electricity. This works out at £106.41 per month or £3.49 per day.





Q9 In the last 12 months, how much have you spent on household energy bills (choose the closest amount)?



Q10 Roughly how much of your monthly income do you spend on energy bills (choose closest amount)




Q12 By how much have household energy bills increased in last 12 months (choose the closest amount




- 75% say the increase in the energy bills has stressed them and affected their mental health
- 69% have regularly had to turn the heating down
- Almost half (47%) have regularly gone without heating
- And 43% have had to cut down on using other appliances
- 19% borrowed money to pay the energy
- 16% have had to regularly go without basics like food and clothes to keep heating on

Q16 Does your child's disability or health condition require you to use more energy? (e.g. special equipment/aids/appliances, more washing, extra heating due to being less mobile)




Q19 If you can, please estimate how much your disability related appliances or aids cost to run (choose closest amount)?




Q20 Did you have to go without any of these disability aids /appliances because you can't afford to run them




Q26 What impact has this increase in your energy bills had on you and your family?



- These energy bill increases are causing increasing stress for 86% of respondents
- 75% turning heating down more often
- 57% stopping or cutting back on household appliance usage – rising to 67% for those who have gone without heating this winter
- 53% will have to regularly go without heating – rising to 78% who have gone with out heating this winter
- 40% say it will make child's condition worse



- 35% will have to go without basics of food and clothes – rising to 53% for those who have gone without heating this winter
- 23% will have to borrow money to pay these increased bills – rising to 40% of single adult households and 43% of those with 4 or more disabled children and 45% for those who have gone without heating this winter


Q31 What is your total annual family household income (include any wages and/or benefits and choose the closest amount)?




- Overall average income of £27,400 pa
- 58% have incomes below £30k pa
- 29% have no one in paid employment



- 29% No one in the household in paid employment
- Overall, only one adult is in paid employment








- 26% of respondents live in single adult households
- On average these respondents live in 2 adult households

- On average respondents live in 2 children under 17 households
- Those 7% who say they have no children 17 or younger are most likely to have adult disabled children



contact For families with disabled children



- The majority pay energy bills by monthly direct debit
 12% pay by prepaid meter (not smart meter)
- 4% pay by prepaid card
- 7% payment on receipt of bill





- 1% of those with incomes less than £20k pa have only one bedroom
- 25% of those with incomes less than £20k pa have two bedrooms
